Virginia Master Gardeners are volunteer educators who work within their communities to encourage and promote environmentally sound horticulture practices through sustainable landscape management education and training. As an educational program of Virginia Cooperative Extension, Virginia Master Gardeners bring the resources of Virginia's land-grant universities, Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, to the people of the commonwealth.

The VCE Master Gardener program is made up of more than 5,500 active and certified Master Gardener volunteers throughout Virginia who contribute over 350,000 hours of volunteer service each year. Almost 1,000 new volunteers are trained annually.

WHEN...

do I become an Extension Master Gardener?

By completing the classroom instruction, you become a Master Gardener Intern. The title of VCE Master Gardener is granted after you complete a minimum of 50 hours of volunteer service conducting horticultural education programs.

To complete annual recertification you must:

- Contribute at least 20 hours of volunteer service each
- Participate in at least 8 hours of continuing education

Extension Master Gardener training involves a variety of topics:

- Herbaceous plants Botany
 - Water quality
 - Pruning
 - Plant pathology (diseases)
 - Plant damage (diagnosis)
 - Pesticides
 - Landscape design
 - Indoor foliage



do Extension Master Gardeners do?

- Provide guidance on sustainable landscapes
- Conduct plant clinics
- Oversee teaching and demonstration gardens
- Staff the VCE Master Gardener Help Desk
- Run annual spring educational seminars

Locally, Prince George Extension Master Gardeners make a difference by participating in specific projects including:

- Prince George Farmers Market Booth, an outreach project that assists local citizens with their horticulture and garden questions.
- Good Gardening Symposium, an annual day-long event featuring well known speakers from Virginia and surrounding states and relevant topics like vegetable gardening, pest management, and landscape design.
- Youth Education, by participating in elementary school math & science days and the Prince George 2nd Grade Farm Day.
- Horticulture Outreach, by maintaining monthly rotating public displays in county libraries & community centers and writing a weekly article for the local newspaper.
